She is married to Joe E. Pray and has two sons, Tyler and McLain. She is the Daughter of Leonard and Rosalie Eishen, former Charlotte residents.



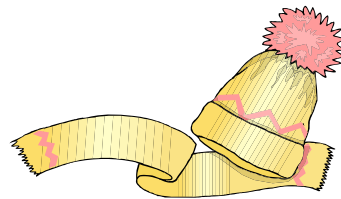

Carol received one of the Chamber's three Community Excellence awards. She has been the president and director of the Eaton Clothing and Furniture Center since 1995. She helped solicit over 30 volunteers a year for the "Back to School" event, where new shoes, clothing, personal hygiene products and school supplies were made available without cost to eligible school children in Eaton and Barry counties.

She has been a member of GFWC-Charlotte for over 25 years, serving as president in 1986-87. She has also chaired many committees.

Carol is active in the First Congregational Church, UCC – deacon, financial secretary, Christian Education Board Chair, General Chair of the Annual Bazaar. She was a founding director of the Housing Services for Eaton County and has written grants for homeless assistance in Eaton County. She coordinated the drafting and printing of a protocol for emergency services for the tri-county ambulance systems, and served as a director on the EATRAN board.

Carol began her career as a dental hygienist, working in private dental offices for 25 years, and was active in the Michigan Dental Hygienists' Association for over 20 years. She graduated from the University of Detroit and later got a BS from Western Michigan University.

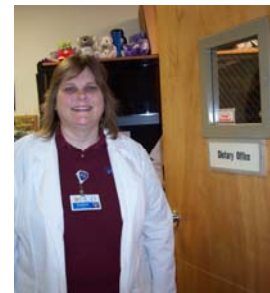
Mobile Meals, Inc.

of Charlotte



Mobile Meals, Inc. of Charlotte began in January, 1971 as the result of an established need called to the attention of General Federation of Women's Clubs-Charlotte (GFWC-Charlotte) by Dr. B. P. Brown. The organization is headed by a seven-person board of directors, one of whom is always the current president of GFWC-Charlotte. Mobile Meals functions with about 100 **unpaid** volunteers from the community – many of whom have been with the program since its inception 37 years ago.

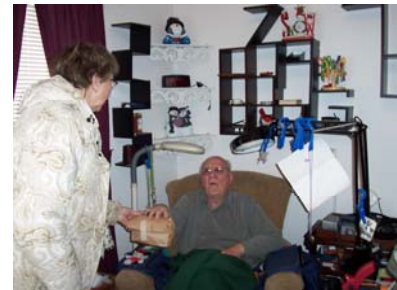
Basically, it provides about 6,500 meals each year to shut-ins, convalescents, physically or mentally handicapped individuals who are unable to adequately care for themselves. This program is based on need, not age or financial criteria. The meals are prepared by Hayes Green Beach Hospital and its dietitian, Julee Emenhiser, oversees this part of the program. She also serves as the Qualifier. Special diets and food preferences are accommodated. The noon meal usually includes cooked meat, poultry, or fish, potato or substitute, vegetable, salad, bread, butter, milk and dessert. The supper meal consists of a sandwich, salad, dessert and milk.



Volunteer drivers are scheduled once a month to pick up the meals at the hospital around 11:15 and deliver a hot meal to the subscribers. A cold supper meal is also available and is delivered with the noon meal. The program operates 365 days per year, including holidays and weekends! GFWC-Charlotte oversees the scheduling and reminding drivers and handles administrative duties. Many of the drivers are from that organization. In addition to the regularly scheduled drivers, substitutes are always needed.

The Eaton County United Way partially subsidizes the cost of each meal, and Food Stamps are accepted. The current cost is \$3 for the hot noon meal and \$2 for the cold supper meal.

Besides meeting food needs of the subscribers, the daily contact boosts morale and has saved lives. It also enables subscribers to be released from hospital stays earlier.
