Our Club's International Project for 2007-2008

Heifer International

Each year our club selects an international project in which to participate. After much interest and support from **you**, our club members, we held a highly successful fund drive in 2006-2007. The board decided to continue our support of Heifer International.

Last year, because of your generous donations, our club was able to purchase a llama, a "Flock of Hope" (which consisted of chicks, ducklings, and goslings), and tree seedlings. Several members passed along a catalog to family members and received donations to Heifer International as Christmas or birthday gifts. What a wonderful idea!!!

Some of you may be unfamiliar with Heifer International. It is an organization established in 1944 that works to help end world hunger through the gift of farm animals AND education. Since its inception, people in 125 countries have been assisted, including families in 38 states in the United States.

Instead of providing families with a non-renewable source of food (a bag of flour or rice, powdered milk, etc.), Heifer International provides a family with an animal AND knowledge. Information about the animal as well as training and education relating to animal care and farming practices supplement the initial gift. A family's health and standard of living improve with the benefits that the gift of one animal provides--which might be milk, eggs, wool, fertilizer, or draft power.

Ultimately, the gift is "passed along," as the offspring of a family's animal are given to other families in need. Within a community, one gift becomes multiple gifts, and an entire community is assisted.

I will have a basket available for your donation at the November and December meetings. Of course, cash will be accepted. If you decide to write a check, please make it out to GFWC-Charlotte. If you are unable to attend either of these meetings, please send your contribution to P.O Box 218/Charlotte. When all of the donations have been collected, the board will determine this year's gift and will send one check to Heifer.
