Ten Commandments for Volunteers

August 1, 2008

1. **Be purposeful.** Know what skills you have to contribute before you arrive on the scene.
2. **Be flexible.** This includes being prepared to do administrative grunt work. (Sorry, not all aid work involves washing babies and hugging orphaned children.)
3. **Be reflective.** Constantly question your motives. Ask yourself why you are helping, think of your motivation, and keep that at the forefront of your mind.
4. **Be receptive.** Learn as much as you can. That said, be wary of engaging for too long with NGO veterans who have become hardened and cynical from their work. Instead, find long-termers with hope still gleaming in their eyes. Then, latch on with open ears.
5. **Be positive.** Take pride in your idealism—it's the only thing that can ward off the inevitability of cynicism's approach in your difficult environment.
6. **Be realistic.** Your idealism can be balanced only by the knowledge that you are not here to save the world, but to play one specific role and that you may never witness the effects of your efforts.
7. **Be independent.** Much of your work will depend on your personal initiative. Be a team player, but do not rely on others to guide you every step of the way.
8. **Be empathetic.** Your ability to succeed will depend entirely on your connection to and understanding of the people you work with.
9. **Be humble.** Don't speak much. Listen. Avoid grandiose conclusions about a problem, community, or philosophy that you were recently introduced to. Act. Think. Feel. But don't come to too many conclusions—they will only halt your experiential learning process.
10. **Have a ball.** Just be sure you've earned it.

The purpose of ESO is to promote a commitment to lifelong learning and self-improvement through reading. It is intended to offer a path to self-enrichment and personal growth for members.

GOALS:

- To encourage clubwomen’s pursuit of higher education
- To create an additional means to unite women in volunteerism
- To develop a support network for women returning to school
- To improve current and develop new study skills
- To stimulate systematic home reading and study with minimum supervision
- To encourage the establishment of home libraries and greater use of public libraries
- To encourage the formation of reading/study/discussion groups

RESPONSIBILITIES:

ESO members are encouraged to participate in club programs such as

- Reading
- Participating in reading/study/discussion groups
- Working to achieve higher ESO levels
- Continuing to pursue self-improvement through personal study

Reading is, of course, the main responsibility of an ESO member. Members may read from an ESO published reading list (available at www.GFWC.org/ESO) or they may choose alternate titles. A report form must be maintained by each member and forwarded to the local chairperson, who, in turn, will forward report totals to the state ESO chairperson. Reporting is usually done once per year. State ESO chairs will issue certificates and awards based on report forms received.

RIF (Reading is Fundamental) REVIEW

It is that time of year to roll out RIF. I was reflecting back in time and thought the new members would be interested in some RIF history. When RIF began, we formed a small group or committee which met once a month. The Chair was Terry Sayre and she was very dedicated to the book distributions. Terry was an avid reader herself so this began her legacy with GFWC-Charlotte. She made each book distribution special. We had guest readers from the community, such as the police chief and fire captain; there were parties for the children at Easter time. Once she had the Olivet College theater group present a play to the children at Head Start. She entered the children at Galewood into the National Poster Contest. Terry was a very special person. When Terry passed away several years ago, her family designated RIF as a memorial in her name. People donated money, which the program has been using to purchase books in the last few years.

I have been fortunate to have two very extraordinary women help me with RIF. I would like to recognize them because they are so dedicated to literacy and they are close friends to me:

JOYCE SPARKS who has coordinated the Read Me A Story program since it was a project nationally 12 years ago. In the beginning, we had three different sites. In fact, one year some of our husbands read to the children. Currently, the only school involved is St. Mary's. Joyce always has readers signed up and it remains very popular with the school children.

LEE FALIK has been helping me with book distributions, stamping books and ordering for the past 10 years. Lee follows Mrs. Noveski, the elementary teacher at Washington Elementary. She first taught kindergarten, then moved on to first grade and currently is teaching second grade. Although we have three book distributions a year, Lee reads to the children once a month she always has a theme for her story time, always a treat and sometimes a costume for a cultural lesson.. Lee definitely shares her artist talents with the class.

Just last year, I have met some new members who have shown interest to keep RIF alive, We welcome them, Jan Kelly, Darlene Freeman and Sylvia Colles. I also invite anyone else who would like to pursue this program.
